

The Royal Collections Gallery invites you to take an extraordinary journey through five centuries of art and culture in a remarkable building.

This public heritage displays a selection of the finest paintings, sculptures, arms and armour, tapestries, decorative arts, coaches and other masterpieces signed by such illustrious names as El Greco, Caravaggio, Velázquez, Goya, Bernini and Canops.

The building, designed by Tuñón and Mansilla, has received ten architecture awards. Its understated elegance and simplicity offset, complement and underscore the magnificent exhibition within.

This gallery is a showcase for the work that Patrimonio Nacional carries out to maintain this valuable cultural heritage but, above all, it is a window onto all the royal sites such as the royal palaces of La Granja, El Pardo and La Almudaina or monasteries and convents such as Yuste and Santa Maria de las Huelgas in Burgos, among many others managed by Patrimonio Nacional.

Of all of them, one **exceptional** complex in the heart of the historic centre of Madrid stands out: the Royal Palace, the Royal Collections Gallery and the Campo del Moro Gardens.

Madrid's Royal Palace is one of the largest in Europe and one of the few official residenes of heads of state that are open to the public. Strolling through the splendid halls on the main floor, exploring the Royal Armoury (the most important in Europe along with the Imperial Armoury in Vienna) or touring the Royal Kitchen (one of the few European palace kitchens still in existence) will take you back to a surprising and spectacular past.

In the Region of Madrid, Patrimonio Nacional manages two sites that have been inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List:

- The Royal Monastery of San Lorenzo de El Escorial, 57 km outside Madrid, was Philip II's most ambitious project. Remarkable for its monumentality and the quality of the works it houses, it was intended as a palace, monastery, royal pantheon, college and seminary. The Casita del Príncipe and Casita del Infante, two free-standing country villas, were erected in the vicinity, and the forest of La Herrería is nearby.
- The Royal Palace of Aranjuez, just 49 km from the capital, is a unique setting that boasts lovely extensive gardens, the country house known as Casa del Labrador and the Museo de Falúas Reales, where royal pleasure crafts are on display.
